The Doctors

When I was young, Mum, my sister and I had a North Walsham Doctor, Dr Hart. Dr McLeod and his wife were also doctors. Dad had a Dr Morrison and the surgery was at what is now the Beechwood Hotel in North Walsham.

Early in the 1930's Dr Miller opened a surgery at St Braddock in Mundesley, so Mum, my sister and I went to Mundesley. My sister and I are still there. Dad kept at North Walsham until he died. You did not have to make an appointment, you just walked in. The first thing you did was count how many people were in the surgery, so you knew when it was your turn. Sometimes the Receptionist would open the surgery door and say, "I am sorry, but the Doctor has been called out for an emergency case and I do not know what time he will be back, so you can wait or come back." At that time of day, the Doctor did two surgeries, one in the morning and one in the evening. He also did home visits and helped at Cromer Hospital. What a busy life he had. I find Mundesley Surgery and the staff very good.

The bi-monthly meeting of the Parish Council with several members of the community attending.

Main points:-

- Mark Ashwell, planning officer from NNDC was welcomed and gave the meeting an overview of the new Local Plan and the developments being included in this plan. The expected life of the new plan would be 2016 to 2036. Clearly one of the main issues is how to provide sufficient housing to meet local and national needs. We had a very good discussion ranging over many points such as cliff erosion and the coast road.

- Gimingham Road Land. You are all very aware of the situation regarding this land and its sale to a private purchaser. We await some activity on the land, which, if it is against planning rules will be reported to NNDC planning office. It is clear that all parties, Parish Council, Gimingham Road residents and the Kearns Foundation need to act together to get a clear understanding and to be able to express our views for ALL in the village.

- Community Housing. Please read the separate report in this newsletter.

- Deep History Coast. The clerk circulated a schedule of works that will take place at the shelter to create the Discovery Point.

- Playing Field land exchange. It was agreed that we will proceed with this exchange and it has been placed with the landowners solicitor. The picnic benches in the playing field will be relocated to the new hall site,

- there will be another meeting to discuss the future of the Pilgrim Shelter on 23rd September in the Shelter. All welcome.

- two planning applications were discussed, one for Woodlands development and the other the Pilgrim Shelter discovery point work. The only objection that was expressed was the occasional smell coming from the Anglia Water overflow close to the hall. It was agreed we would contact Anglia Water to express our view.

- Poor lands. This area which has belonged to the village for some while has fallen into some disarray. It was agreed that Harrison's would proceed to register this land and make a donation to the Parish Council in due course

Nature Notes for August

Update on the Cromer peregrines. I was in the car park one evening and could hear screeching. As I got to the church a man with a large telescope said that one of the adult birds had just flown in with a dead pigeon hence the noise. All 3 young were doing well.

Another update. Not such good news I'm afraid. The swans in Felbrigg are now down to 2 cygnets which are well grown so should be safe. The lake was abounding with blue damselflies and several species of dragonflies including a number of Wide-bodied Hawkers. In the woods I found a clump of pink flowers rather like large buttercups. When I checked later, I discovered them to be Mallows as in marshmallows whose seed were originally used for flavouring. Who'd have guessed.

A few evenings ago, as I was closing my back door, I saw a movement under a bird feeder. Thinking it was a rat I got my gun but saw it was a hedgehog. I followed it into the field, but it disappeared. However, there were 2 hares in the paddock which ran away when they saw me. There are good numbers of grasshoppers both green and brown in the garden.

Idiots have been trying to push seals back into the sea at Winterton and allowing their dogs to run free around them. These are wild animals with large teeth that could and probably would kill if challenged.

At Hickling I saw 2 species of rare butterflies, the yellow swallowtail and the white admiral but there have also been lots of meadow browns, gatekeepers' ringlets, speckled woods and a few commas. These are bright red/orange at rest but brown with wings closed and a white comma shape so you can tell what it is.

On a visit to Minsmere RSPB there were lots of 6 spot burnet moths, which fly during the day. As a result, I found several batches of yellow and black striped caterpillars on Oxford ragwort. I met a couple who were bee and wasp experts. They were photographing a mixed colony of ground nesting species including mining bees, feathered bees, jewelled wasps and the fascinating (to me at least) bee-wolf wasp, it catches honeybees paralyzes them and takes them back to its burrow and lays an egg on them. The egg hatches and the wasp grub eats the bee. It then eventually develops into a wasp and the whole thing starts again. They are, of course, female.
