One day when I was cycling home from work when I got near the caravan site entrance I happened to look across to the sea. So far across, near White Gate Lane, there was a big straw stack with children playing on top of it. The next time I looked across there were flames coming from the top of the straw stack. The next thing I saw was the children running towards the cliff to hide in the Plantation Wood. They were not found when they were being looked for. Also, they were very lucky they never burned as a straw stack burns very quickly.

In the same place during the war, there was a straw stack and most of it was used for the cattle. The rest was set alight to burn it and the rubbish that was left around it. When it got a good fire going there was ammunition flying about as the area was the battle area. The soldiers put the live ammunition in the stack so that they did not have to fire it and got back home quicker.

Nature Notes for November

On a stormy day I went to see the seals at Horsey beach, it was just after high tide and there were more than 80 adult seals crammed up against the dunes, both bulls and cows, but there weren't any pups yet as it was early October. The beach had not yet been roped off for safety so some people weren't content to view from a safe distance, 3 couples came along the beach under the dunes chattering and pointing, within a couple of metres of the seals, which caused a bit of a panic amongst the herd which moved down the beach a few metres. The stupid people strolled about 25 metres upwind of the seals and started throwing a large pink beach ball to each other. It blew straight into the herd causing more panic and around 25 fled back into the sea from where they had recently struggled to emerge. The idiots were fortunate that the animals reacted in the way they did. If there had been pups they might have been more aggressive, and the bulls are more than 3 metres (10 feet) long. Just after this family with young children came along and the little boy was allowed within 5 metres before being restrained by the grandfather.

On a better note, as I was cycling to Mundesley one calm morning I looked at over the cliff at Beacon Farm to see if my friend Robert was getting his crab pots in. There was no sign of his boat but there a large black shape on the surface about 250 metres offshore, it then disappeared. A couple of days later the EDP reported sightings of 2 humpback whales. Did I see one? I think so. I mentioned it to Robert who sees seals and dolphins frequently and whales occasionally and he said that It is herring spawning time off the Norfolk Suffolk border, so the whales are following their food source.

Fungi are everywhere at this time and this year there is a bumper crop of many varieties. I met a group of experts in Pigneys Wood who had collected 25 different kinds, some edible others not, including such as yellow stainer, shaggy ink cap and parasol some of which I have seen are nearly a foot across. I have also found fly agaric, stink horn, cep or boletus, wood blewits, sulphur tuft which is not to be confused with the edible oyster fungus. They are very similar and grow in the same type of location. I have been eating the horse mushrooms from the paddock behind my house. Still on fungi, have you seen the size of the fairy ring in the church yard, I counted 32 paces across which is more than last year, and the ring is more complete than I have seen before,

I got a new sighting on the lake at Felbrigg, my first goosander since I moved to Norfolk. It was a handsome male, stark black and white just sitting in the middle, not diving, just sitting. There were plenty in the Peak District and they bred on the river Wye at Hathersage, about 6 miles from us and in spring we often saw the young riding on the mother's back. It isn't common to see them on lakes as they seem to prefer clear flowing rivers. There was some controversy a few years ago when the then Duke of Devonshire wished to shoot some of them on some of the rivers that he "owned" because they were taking "his" fish, but it was put a stop to.

The dark nights are with us again, but I will continue to go out during the daylight hours and keep my eyes open for anything interesting.
